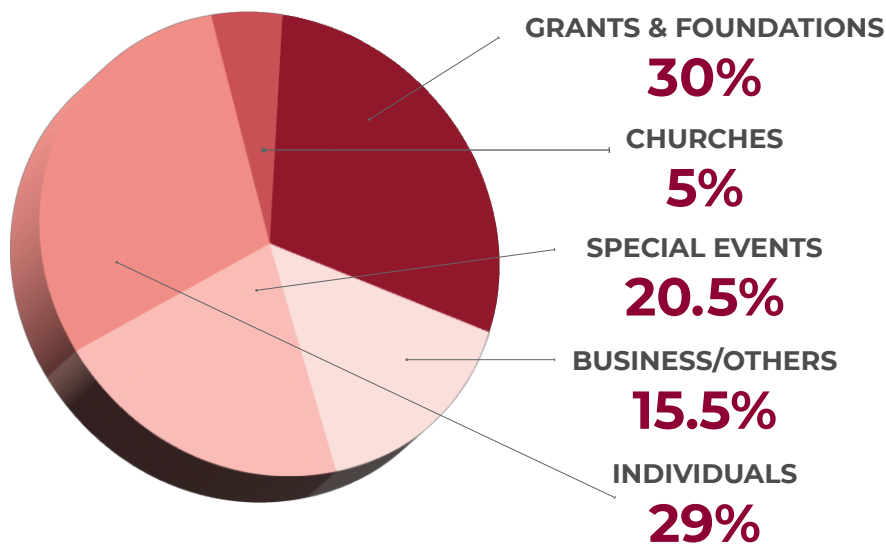

Human trafficking bills signed into law

New measures bolster fight against offenders, protections for victims.

It's not often that a priority of Gov. Brian Kemp's office gets unanimous approval from Georgia lawmakers. It's even rarer that the measures pass repeatedly without a single "no" vote. But that's been the case with Kemp's efforts to crack down on human trafficking, a push driven largely by his wife, Marty Kemp, who worked with lawmakers to

A third measure, House Bill 12 would have initially required students starting in kindergarten learn about the risks of tobacco use and vaping. But at the urging of a local Girl Scout troop, lawmakers agreed to add a provision that educates students in sixth grade about human trafficking.

All passed unanimously, lowering earlier human trafficking measures that passed only on opposition.

CELEBRATING! 35 YEARS!

Thirty-five years ago, Gwinnett Children's Shelter was a state-contracted shelter for youth transitioning to foster care. But that all changed in 2013 when it shifted to become a privately-funded home for young moms and their children experiencing homelessness.

"I was brought on board to close down the old program that was Gwinnett Children's Shelter and take us in a new direction," said CEO Maureen Kornowa.

"We started looking for a new name or a word to describe what we were doing. And hope was one of those words. It just rang true for most of us — and for me — because that's what we were doing here. We were instilling hope where people felt hopeless.

"It's also this negative, cold feeling around a shelter. It feels institutional," she added. "We wanted this to be home. A place of refuge. So, 'Home of Hope' was a natural progression."

As Home of Hope celebrates its 35 years of history, they're also looking toward the future.

"If you don't change as the world changes, you die. We're looking forward to being part of what comes next," Maureen added.

So, what will come next for Home of Hope?

"We're hoping to be part of the affordable housing arena. Not sure what that looks like yet, but we have opportunities there," she said. "And we want to work closely with our nonprofit partners so we can all leave this world a little better than we found it."

YOUNG MOM LEARNS HOW TO LIVE A LIFE SHE NEVER THOUGHT POSSIBLE

She was caught in an abusive relationship and had nowhere else to go. Nikki, her daughter and her son needed something more. But when Nikki couldn't afford rent, a family friend told her about Home of Hope. She was uncertain, though.

"I did not want to go to a shelter. But Home of Hope is like a home, not a shelter," Nikki said. "From the rooms and how they're set up to the way the staff acts with you to activities for the kids, things to do and gifts at holidays...they treat you like family."

Having a group of people rallying around her and pushing her forward was just the encouragement Nikki needed.

"Before, my life was all over the place. But the Home of Hope staff welcomes you with open arms and pushes you to want to do better. When you're having a bad day, they're there to talk to and listen to you," she said.

After a year at Home of Hope, Nikki and her kids have now lived for more than six months in their own apartment. And Nikki is taking other steps toward some of her goals for the future.

"I came to Home of Hope with \$0 in my bank account, and I left with \$10,000 in my savings," she said. "My goals are to have a house by the time I turn 35, to go back to school to be a nurse, and to not live paycheck to paycheck but live comfortably.

"I also want to be an inspirational speaker — to use my story to help other people. It's always made me feel better to know that I'm not the only one going through hard times."

And Nikki's message to the Home of Hope staff and donors comes from a heart filled with appreciation.

"To the staff: I don't know where I'd be right now [without you]. Home of Hope honestly saved my life and my kids' lives and just put us on a better path than we were on. To the donors: You're using your donations for the right thing; you've really helped us," she said.

"Thank you to Home of Hope for opening a door for me and my kids. Home of Hope is a blessing."
