
#### MESSAGE FROM MAUREEN

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Sara's Rise from Homelessness to Empowerment


She'd never been homeless before. "But I suppose there's a first time for everything," said 31-year-old Sara, single mom to boys ages 10 and five.

Sara has provided full-time for her family for years. But a procedure in March of 2022 greatly affected her physical, mental and emotional state. Sara didn't even want to continue with life.


Despite knowing her situation, Sara was let go from her job via a separation notice in the mail. Her savings dwindled, and Sara and her family became homeless in July of 2022. They stayed in a hotel for a month, with a family friend for a week, and even slept in their car for a few nights.

"After calling around, I had a page front and back of places to call for help. I was waitlisted, told places had no space and a bunch of different things. Home of Hope was the last place on my list – they were literally my last hope." she said.

Since coming to Home of Hope, Sara has had the chance to learn – and unlearn – a lot. Practically, Sara has gained a number of skills while at Home of Hope, but she's gotten to know herself better, too.

"Home of Hope really has been home for the past year. I've learned structure, stability and consistency in classes every Wednesday; to be held accountable; to communicate; to relearn myself; and heal from previous traumas and situations I allowed." Sara said.

"I've also learned to stay present in the moment; to put myself and my children first; to give myself a ton of grace and compassion; to not worry about other people, places and things that don't inspire, drive or support me; and that I don't need anybody but God and a good support system around me."

Having the support she needed has allowed Sara to look past her struggles to see a brand-new future she could only have dreamed of before.

"One of my goals for the future is to own at least an acre of land to have my own spot and stability for me and my children," she said. "I also want to become a life coach. I've been through addiction, homelessness, being a single mother, abusive relationships and toxicity. I want to let others know that they're not alone – and if I can overcome these obstacles, they can, too."

For those who donate to Home of Hope, **Sara is grateful**, firmly believing that Home of Hope has set her and her kids up for success.

# **Bridging the Gap**

## Financial Empowerment Through Home of Hope

At Home of Hope, we understand that financial stability is essential. Many families need extra assistance due to a lack of financial literacy. That's where Lisa Jackson steps in. With over 25 years of experience in banking and finance, she volunteers as a Life Skills teacher to empower our residents with financial knowledge during our weekly Wednesday evening classes

Lisa's volunteer journey at Home of Hope began when she learned about our mission to help women and children rehabilitate their lives. Financial education is a key part of this mission.

"I just loved their story. I met Maureen through one of my associates around three years ago, and we instantly became friends. She shared how Home of Hope helps women and children really rehabilitate their lives; I knew I wanted to get involved. They teach finance classes, and finance is my life," laughed Lisa Jackson, AVP and Manager of First Citizens Bank.

In her five-month Life Skills class, Lisa covers essential aspects of financial literacy, including budgeting, improving credit scores, and setting SMART goals. These classes go beyond the basics and address the emotional and psychological aspects of money management, helping residents make better financial decisions.

"There's a lot that is not normally taught. We talk about how your values and feelings play a lot into your decisions about money. We talk about peer pressure, how you respond to emergencies, if you plan ahead or tend to act in the moment. The decisions you make today often determine what your future will look like," said Lisa.

Lisa understands the power of financial literacy and has a heart for sharing this tool with the moms at Home of Hope.

"If your finances are not in order, then your life is not going to be in order. Financial stress causes so many problems, and I wanted to help these women build a strong financial foundation so they could find independence," said Lisa.

Through the Life Skills classes, Lisa has found a way to impact not only the women of Hope of Hope but also herself.

"Finance is boring, but we make it fun," laughed Lisa. "These women are definitely here to change their lives. I see that desire in their hearts and in how they respond in class. They're here to learn and gain wisdom to help them rehabilitate their lives. It's amazing. It's very rewarding for me, and I think for them too."
